Senior Pastor Reflection

Find Joy...In EVERYTHING! (What brings you joy?)

e are just a hop, step and a jump away from Easter Sunday or, as some call it, Resurrection Sunday. Whatever you call it, the outcome is the same.

Easter is always the transition point of spring; flowers start popping out of the ground, the trees have buds, the cherry blossoms are in full bloom at the University of Washington Quad, and sometimes (but rarely), a hail storm transpires. We put it all in God's hands. Whatever the temperature may be that day; the church will always be ready for another Easter celebration! What have you learned during this season of Lent? Did you find what you were searching for?

Over the past couple of years, I have asked myself that question over and over. During this Lenten season, I've been working on a new spiritual

discipline: to find joy in **everything** that I do. That's got to be one of the most difficult spiritual disciplines I've yet to try. Finding joy in an unexpected flat tire on the way to an important meeting. Finding joy during a tumultuous political climate. Finding joy in learning to play the ukulele with the Blaine Ukulele Group of Seattle (B.U.G.S.). Finding joy in family and friends. Or, how about this: finding joy in being a follower of Christ.

I know that on the first Easter morning when the women went to the tomb to take care of Jesus' body, there had to be a lack of joy. The stone was rolled away, and when they went in, there was no body to be found. There was great concern. But all of a sudden, from behind them, a question was asked, "Why do you look for the living among the dead? He isn't here but has been raised."

Those are the joyous words, "He isn't here, but He has been raised."

Friends, this Easter that is where the joy can be found, in knowing that Jesus has been raised. And this is something that Christ did for each one of us. Christ died to take away the sins of the world. Christ died because Jesus loved us so much. Who else would do that? This is why I find Easter so joyous!

During the Lenten season, I found great joy in an announcement that was made after worship on Sunday, March 23, 2025. It was announced that PNW Resident Bishop Cedrick D. Bridgeforth will appoint Job Pangilinan to be the Associate Pastor of Blaine Memorial UMC, effective July 1, 2025. Job will be commissioned as a provisional member of the Pacific Northwest Conference in June at Annual Conference. He is

an active member and a candidate for ministry at Fairwood Community United Methodist Church in Renton, WA. Job will oversee our Children's, Youth, and Family Ministries. With extensive work and life experience in corporate, education and legal fields and professions, Job brings to the church strong gifts in administration, systems analysis and implementation, and efficiency evaluation. My hope is that together we will create a dynamic. fluid and creative team where we can continue to grow our existing ministries and breathe new life into other areas of the church!

It was a joyous celebration when Blaine Memorial UMC was invited by Kimball Elementary School Principal Angela Sheffey-Bogan to witness community artist and friend to Blaine, Erin Shigaki, as she unveiled *The Cloud Pavilion* 雲の幄舎 (kumo no akusha) mural in the library (see front cover). Blaine Memorial UMC brought more than 30 people to the unveiling of the mural. The Cloud Pavilion conveys the histories, hopes, and relationships of both Kimball Elementary students and Beacon Hill residents.

Blaine Memorial UMC welcomed Seattle Councilmember (Position #8) Alexis Mercedes Rinck and Seattle Councilmember Mark Solomon (Position #2) to a Town Hall Meeting. We welcomed more than 55 people that evening, with 90% of the people from the neighborhood! Both CM Rinck and CM Solomon talked about funding shortfalls and other negative impacts of the Trump administration, public safety in the Chinatown International District, affordable housing, and protections for Seattle renters.

It is time for us to remember once again, my friends, and proclaim the good news: Christ is risen! And we, too, shall rise with joy. May we all be blessed and find new meaning as we celebrate together the story of Christ, love, and resurrection! Happy Easter!

uring this Lenten season, I've found that taking intentional time for reflection has been deeply rewarding. Spiritual Formation Center Being at the Table

t's Lent and I love our book study, "Meeting Jesus at the Table". I've been feeling nourished.

The book makes me realize that when we show up at the Lord's Table, especially when we're hungry, we're going to be fed. With Christ as our host, there is plenty for everyone, and the invitation is always there.

This reminds me of pre-COVID. For years, there were folks at Blaine Memorial who prepared meals in our kitchen and other folks served the food to our unhoused friends under the freeway bridge in downtown Seattle. We were responding to severe 'food insecurity' through the Lord's Table ministry.

I pray that our readers can take a moment to remember or imagine how hungry our friends who stood in line were. Most of us may not need to stand in such a line. Yet may I suggest that there may be a moment or maybe even many moments when you are hungry -- i.e., hungry for "hope, for courage, for companionship," as noted in our Lenten book. The authors remind us that people are starving. They say that "food and eating are just metaphors." We are all starving for something.

I know personally that I am starving for grace. "For all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God and are justified freely

by his grace through the redemption that came by Christ Jesus." (Romans 3:23-24). Yet, how often do I not accept Jesus' offer to join Him at the Table? I am too busy or clueless that He's already present at the Table. But I so want to feel His protection, His forgiveness, His warmth and love.

I know that I have the privilege of being at the Table with Jesus when I'm in Sunday Worship, especially during Holy Communion. I am also at the Table and being fed when I'm with my sisters-in-Christ during our Tuesday Small Group meetings on the ZOOM screen. Similarly, when I call in to Wednesday morning Prayer and Coffee. Just as the disciples sat around the Table and chatted, complained,

laughed, prayed, our souls are being fed by Jesus.

It seems that at
Blaine, there are many
opportunities to meet with
Jesus at His Table. There
are the big banquets like
Sukiyaki and Bazaar or
occasional ones like an
Anniversary Celebration
and more frequent ones like
Social Hour.

Yet I find myself at the Table with Jesus most often when it's just the two of us. Sometimes it's a potluck and I bring my dish too, a little bit to serve others as He's asked me to do.

- Prayers for peace in all areas of the world touched by war in Syria, Israel, Palestine, Iraq, Yemen, Sudan, South Sudan, Ethiopia, Russia, Ukraine, and in many other areas that are unknown to us.

- imposition of tariffs, the delay of tariffs, has sparked fears of a trade war, affecting nations far and wide. We pray for economic stability, for wisdom among leaders to navigate these turbulent waters, and for the well-being of all who are affected by these changes.

The first earthquake had a magnitude of 7.7, centered around Sagaing City, the capital of the north western Sagaing region of Myanmar. We pray for the safety of people in the midst of natural disaster and war.
- Prayers of joy for Suni Williams and Butch Wilmore, the two American astronauts who returned safely to Earth after being stranded on the International Space Station for nine months.
- Prayers of joy as we rejoice with New York resident Sebastien Beauzile, the first patient ever cured of Sickle Cell Anemia.
- Prayers for Kilmar Abrego Garcia, a Maryland man who was mistakenly deported to a mega-jail in El Salvador.
 Prayers that he is returned safely to the US.
- Prayers for people in the United States, where legal residents are being deported for being activists and fear that rights of free speech only apply to some, and we lift up all those who are unsafe in "peaceful" surroundings.
- Prayers for people in the United States as President Trump invoked the Alien Enemies Act of 1798 for the first time since World War II, granting himself sweeping powers under a centuries-old law to deport people associated with a Venezuelan gang. During World War II, with anti-foreigner fears sweeping the country, it was part of the legal rationale for mass incarceration in the United States of people of German, Italian and especially Japanese and Japanese American ancestry. An estimated 120,000 people with Japanese heritage, including those with U.S. citizenship, were incarcerated during the war. We pray for the protection of democratic freedom, for the safety of all citizens, and for leaders who uphold justice and equality for all.
- We continue to pray for the work of Tsuru for Solidarity, our partnership with them, and the work that we all continue to do for the greater good. May we continue to educate, advocate, and protest to close all U.S. concentration camps. May we continue to build solidarity with other communities of color that have experienced forced removal, detention, deportation, separation of families, and other forms of racial and state violence. May God continue to heal each one of us through community, and shared stories by addressing our trauma.
- We continue to pray for those struggling to find safe and affordable housing, and for families facing the threat of being unhoused. Grant them the strength to persevere and the resources to find stable homes. May our communities be filled with compassion and action, creating spaces where everyone can thrive.
